

Inspiration to Paint

Just to give a bit of context, I'm the son-in-law of Better Laidler, one of your long standing congregation who very sadly is no longer with us.

Amongst the A levels I took at Woodland School, Coventry, was Art, up to the age of 18. The strange thing was that I cannot remember being actually taught any techniques how to paint and draw. We were just told to go and paint X, Y and Z from the



Cathedral to a kitchen kettle, given some materials and just get on with it! Apart from a few pencil sketches in Dorset or abroad on holiday I didn't actually paint again for the best part of 40 years.

Time rolled on and normal life happened, then we came to 2021, six months into the Covid pandemic. Being unable, like us all, to do any outside hobbies which for me was golf and seeing friends for days out, I was at a loss as to what to do.

After watching an episode of either Sky Landscape or Portrait Artist of the Year, I suddenly thought why not give painting a go? I found a few tubes of watercolour paint, brushes and pretty cheap paper in a drawer and decided to have a go. To say I wasn't happy with my first painting of an old water mill would be an understatement! Bear in mind I had no idea how to paint using watercolour and it turns out there's a fair few techniques to get to grips with.

Of course you couldn't go to any live art classes I the pandemic so I turned to YouTube for help and found two channels by artists whose style and delivery of teaching I liked. These were Karen Rice and Paul Clark, both professional artists who, being unable to teach in person because of the pandemic, turned to YouTube to make some money.

After watching several of their videos showing the basics of how to use watercolour, I did a simple landscape of a lake with mountains in the background and it was much better. I learned so much from watching these artists. How to do basic washes of colour, to mix my own colours, all about techniques like wet onwet, wet on dry, dry brush stroke, splattering, use of salt, line and wash and many more. Also the importance of using proper watercolour paper, good brushes and palettes to mix your colours.

They taught me to understand the importance of doing a good drawing first with the right perspective and loose but accurate lines as the basis for

your painting and how to come up with a good composition. It became apparent that you don't have to just "copy" a photograph or stick to a view you can see when you're out in the countryside. You as the artist can decide what you put in your painting, where it goes and how big or small it is. Say you don't think a tree or building is in the best place to make your work look good. Just move it, delete it or paint it whatever colours you like. If you want pink trees or a purple lake, that's fine!

That first painting was on 24th January 2021. Since that time I've done over 250 paintings, drawings or sketches—landscapes, seascapes, animals, birds, vehicles, aircraft and even some portraits. I found that the most difficult thing to paint is the human face, to make it reasonably realistic but "arty" as well. Yet another YouTube artist helped me with this (Xaki art) and learning the Loomis method of drawing faces. I've even given away some paintings as gifts, such as my son's dog Bonny, a Westie, for their wedding anniversary or some as Christmas, Easter or Valentine cards.

You obviously have your ups and downs with watercolour paintings just like with life and faith. Some I still think are rubbish, but I've learned not to bin them. Some you think—yes, I've done a half decent job there.

The thing is to keep on painting whenever the inspiration takes hold. I've tried doing it almost for the sake of doing it and invariably it doesn't work. Even then you can think of it as a learning exercise which is expanding your experience. It's just as important to know what doesn't work as well as what does.

Whilst attending the Wednesday morning communion service for Remembrance Day last year I admired the painting of a poppy on the font, part of the craft ladies' wonderful display. I was talking to Karen about it when she asked if I painted as well. It was then putto me if I would be willing to paint something for Easter this year that could be used by the Church. I said I'd have a go and after a few weeks came up with four different paintings which I've given to Rev Gail. Hopefully you'll get to see some of these.

In conclusion I'd say that painting and learning about watercolour has really benefited me as a person. When I'm doing a watercolour I'm utterly focused on the task and I get a lot of enjoyment from it all. I'd recommend trying watercolour painting to everyone—give it a go. There are of course plenty of in-person art classes now to help you as well as YouTube. You may come to really like it and relish the experience like I do.

coming of warmer days as well as spring flowers and of course newborn lambs. I enjoy watching small groups of lambs racing each other in the fields around Welford, or more usually on top of a log or mud pile; to



me this is a clear sign that spring has sprung.

We heard that there was a film crew in the village, down by St Peter's Church around some of the old cottages, I think it's a murder mystery. Hopefully I can reveal all later in the year. It's a bit like watching Shakespeare and Hathaway which is filmed in Stratford, I think it showcases Stratford, perhaps that's why there is a lot of visitors who come to taste Stratford's hospitality. I felt we were like sisters, what a small world.

The family have all popped over the last few weeks. Some meals I cooked, others we tasted at the local pubs, the Blue Boar, and just over the road The Four Alls who do a lovely Sunday lunch, it was just nice to be together.

Another major event was when Jemima laid eight large eggs opposite on the island; she keeps adding to them. At the last count this morning there are about 16, I don't think they will hatch as they haven't been fertilised. Sad really for her, she does sit on them occasionally and so does the Canada goose, and the little ducks go and have a nose round. Jemima is often bothered by ducks and Canada geese when I feed her and they are all

greedy, so I have to feed her just as I get up about 7 am before the other birds are awake so she can enjoy her feed on her own. But to my surprise this morning, serenely swimming round were the two swans who go onto the island and start preparing a nest so we will have to wait and see.

I was spared helping out at Parish lunch this month, so could sit and enjoy a lovely meal but most of all is the fellowship.

During the lovely warm sunny days there is nothing more I enjoy than sitting on my balcony reading and enjoying a cup coffee. It feels like my own personal retreat as there is always a different picture on the river, the birds ducking and diving, I guess it's their idea of a shower, it seems to go on for ages, and then they sit on the grass drying off.

Yesterday I set off in bright sunshine to visit a friend, getting into the car I donned my sunglasses and forgot that I was wearing them. My friend and I chatted happily, and before I left realised I had my sunglasses on all afternoon. I smiled as I drove home reflecting on the fact that sometimes we go through times as we journey through life when our understanding of our faith and our awareness of the presence of God remains dimmed by busyness and overwhelming life events. The words of a familiar song comes into my mind: **Open our eyes Lord, we want to see Jesus.**


May you find the time to stop this Easter, to journey with Jesus, to know how deeply God loves you.

By the time you read this we will be well into our journey through Lent and looking forward to Easter and all it holds. For some of us Lent began on the beautiful Holy Island of Lindisfarne where we had the privilege of walking in the footsteps of Saints Aiden and Cuthbert and the many pilgrims who trod those shores throughout time.

We were able to reflect on Jesus' time in the wilderness. There were certainly some bleak and lonely places to explore and opportunities to come close to God. However we were well fed and not tempted to turn stones into bread! But when considering Jesus in the wilderness there are some interesting aspects to ponder upon. If you read the account in Mark you will notice that the Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness but in Matthew and Luke he was led by the Spirit. This speaks to us in all our circumstances. Sometimes we are gently led by God and at other times we are powerfully driven.
