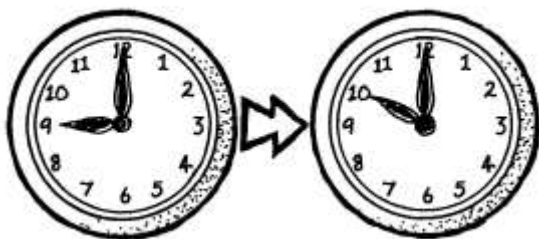

## With love from the Vicar

I tend to listen to the news on the radio, rather than watching it on TV, and couldn't quite believe my ears this week when I woke up hearing about Adrian Simancas, the 24 year old kayaker from Chile who, along with his kayak, was swallowed whole by a humpback whale and, thankfully, spat out again soon after! It was a remarkable story and, when I heard there was video footage of this – well, I just had to see it!



It reminded me of the story of Jonah in the Bible. God asks Jonah to go to a city called Nineveh to encourage them to take a change of direction in the way they live, away from the destructive, and more towards the goodness God desires and intends for them. Jonah does what many of us do though and decides to attempt to run away from God's calling and go his own way. He boards a ship to take him far away from Nineveh, only to find that the ship is caught in a violent storm. The sailors on board cast lots to find out who is responsible for the calamity and the lot falls to Jonah. In desperation, Jonah tells the crew to throw him into the sea so that things will calm down and they will be saved. Reluctantly, they follow his instructions.

The story has it that Jonah, rather like our Chilean kayaker, was swallowed by a huge fish. This fish didn't spit him out straight away though. Jonah spent three days and three nights in its belly and that certainly gave him some serious time for reflection! His prayers are ones we can still turn to today: 'In my distress I called to the Lord, and he answered me. From deep in the realm of the dead I called for help, and you listened to my cry.' Whatever may be engulfing us, overwhelming us or threatening to swallow us up at the moment, we can be assured that God will go to every length to get us through it, to make a way for us and to be there for us in the midst of it all. Jonah's three days in the darkness of his marine captivity are often seen to foreshadow the three days between Jesus' death on the cross and his rising to new life. Out of the depths of despair comes new hope and new beginnings.

Jonah's story has a link with Ash Wednesday (5<sup>th</sup> March this year) and the beginning of Lent. You've probably heard the term 'to repent in sackcloth and ashes'. This phrase is found in the book of Jonah. When Jonah finally does get to Nineveh and lets the king and the city know that they

desperately need to change their ways, the people respond positively and pro-actively. They demonstrate their willingness to take a new direction (to repent) by putting on sackcloth and ashes and fasting collectively. As a result, the threatened destruction is averted, and they are restored through their openness to God's message.

This is why 'ashing' is still used to mark the beginning of Lent with the opportunity to have the forehead marked with a cross in ashes, traditionally formed from the burning of palm crosses from the year before. We are reminded that 'from dust we came and from dust we shall return' – in other words, that we're not invincible or immortal. Lent can be a wake up call for us, as Jonah's message was to the people of Nineveh, an opportunity to reflect on where we might need a change of heart and direction. Thankfully, for most of us, that won't involve being swallowed by a whale!

# Life by the River



Here we are again, already the middle of February, where is the year going? It has been quite chilly of late, life is moving so quickly and I have to think what I have been up to since I last wrote.

I mentioned I had joined U3A; our first talk was from a lady who was a prison governor for over 30 years, and was at many prisons around the country, some women's and some men's but mostly Victorian by

design which made aspects of the job very difficult. It was a very interesting talk and we all enjoyed it.

I helped present a Bible to our first Baptism family, it was the first of many the Mothers Union decided to present to the family and it was a joyous service.

My daughter Melanie came over for a meal last weekend with my great grandsons, Otis who is two. He loved it when we went onto the balcony, and I whistled Jemima and quickly across the River she came followed by her friends, two ducks. There was a lot of laughter at the feeding of Jemima, but a lot of feed landed on the garden and would be gobbled up by the fox who comes around when we are sleeping.

Another talk we had was at our Mothers' Union meeting as we welcomed two of our congregation who are Street Pastors in Stratford Town once a month on a Friday from 8pm to 12 midnight. It is a very worth while job and greatly appreciated by whoever they meet on their rounds. Their role is to be non-judgemental, compassionate and caring, they are fully supported by the different agencies, and helped by a big bank of CCTV cameras, not only monitoring Stratford, but surrounding villages.

Fish and chip lunch for the over 60's held in Welford—always tasty and good to meet up with friends. Our Parish Lunch follows the week later and I was asked to help serve again. I must be doing it well as this is the third out of four lunches! I have to have a rest when I get home as I did 2,500 steps in two hours, I sometimes fall asleep at the drop of a eyelid.

The river is much the same except we have a few Canada Geese who attack the other birds and if they are around I don't bring my tub of food out for

Jemima, but wait till they disappear. The two swans come most days. In Stratford by the Theatre there is a black swan—I wish she would come up the river to visit us.

One of the most lovely sights at this time of year is the amount of snowdrops that are springing up in the hedgerows along the road. It brings a smile to my face that we may be turning the corner into spring.

As we move forward in the next few weeks into Lent, let us put a time in the day where we can focus on God and the journey Jesus made to the cross.

## **A Lent Reflection**

Somebody asked a Christian friend why he was eating doughnuts, when he had given them up for Lent! He answered, *'At the bakers I told God, that if He wanted me to buy doughnuts, He should provide a parking space in front. On the eighth time around, there it was!'* Rather than seeing Lent simply as a time to give things up, let's use it intentionally for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer.

At Jesus' baptism, God's voice says, *'You are My Son, whom I love; with You I am well pleased.'* (Luke 3:22). The Holy Spirit then leads Jesus into the wilderness, where we find Him coming to terms with who He is. Satan's temptations challenge Jesus in key three areas of His identity: His divine sonship, political power and Messianic role (Luke 4: 1-13). It is as though Jesus was looking into the mirror at Himself to discern what kind of Saviour He should be.

For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask the question, *'who am I?'* It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves? Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All of these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives.

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

## THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This year the greater part of March is taken up by the season of Lent. It begins with Ash Wednesday on the 5<sup>th</sup>. It is an austere time when the vestments in church are purple and no flowers decorate the chancel.

Lent heralds the time for us to take a new look at ourselves, our relationship with God and with one another. Lent gives us the opportunity to shake off our illusions and face the reality and the responsibility of what we are, God's people.

On the first Sunday in Lent we are reminded of the episode when Jesus is tempted by the devil in the wilderness and how he overcomes. This has led to the tradition whereby people have given up something during this period. Perhaps a better idea might be to take up something. It could be joining a house group, setting aside time to read a book of the Bible or praying each day for someone in need. The possibilities are endless.

I recently came across an item in "A Bucket of Surprises" compiled by J. John and Mark Stibbe which is comical but does have a serious meaning. Something to take to heart and follow not just in Lent but throughout the year. It's called Noah's lessons from his life.



1. Do not miss the boat.
2. Remember that we are all in the same boat.
3. Plan ahead, it was not raining when Noah built the ark.
4. Stay fit. When you are 600 years old some may ask you to do something really big.
5. Do not listen to critics, just get on with the job that needs to be done.
6. Build your future on high ground.
7. In the interests of safety always travel in pairs.
8. Speed is not always an advantage. The snails were on board with the cheetahs.
9. When you are stressed float a while.
10. No matter the storm, when you are with God there is always a rainbow waiting.

Let's try to make this time of Lent a positive experience so that when Holy Week and Easter come we will have strengthened our relationship with God and with one another.
